WHO'S TEACHING YOUR KIDS?

With this profile, the *Poobah* begins a series of four articles about the public schools many of our children track through as they journey from kindergarten to high school graduation. While we can't profile all the outstanding teachers who influence your children—and they are many—we can profile the principals who set the tone for their schools and oversee the daily learning process with skill and compassion. This is our tribute to the public school that serve Berkeley.



Stephanie HughesLily B. Clayton Elementary School

I grew up in Fort Worth, attended Bluebonnet Elementary (note: in the Fall of 2000 Bluebonnet became McLean 6th Grade Center), McLain Middle School, and Paschal. After graduating, I attended North Texas University for my undergraduate degree, eventually pursuing a Masters at UT Arlington and a doctorate at Baylor.

In 1999, I began my professional career with FWISD, teaching middle school math for a few years before becoming an administrator. Seventeen years ago I was selected for a principalship. I truly love being a principal, especially my eleven years here at Lily B.

Because I am a devoted mom, I believe my family

orientation is central to my leadership perspective. I know with our family of three children, two were very successful and one struggled. Now that our children are older, we are still very engaged as parents. Our oldest works in Austin and our youngest is a freshman soccer player at the University of the Ozarks.

What do I do for fun? I used to run half-marathons, participating in six of these runs. I keep telling myself I need to take up running again, maybe not marathons. Also, I love baking desserts, which might be another motivation to get back into running.

Lily B. is a true treasure. We are 101 years old, with a legacy to make a difference for students. Then, now, and always, we are about nurturing our children and celebrating our special neighborhood.

Lily B.'s PK-5 student enrollment is just about 490. We are small enough to get to know our kids individually and large enough to provide special programs. In my years at Lily B. I have seen many changes, such as the 2013 addition of our dual-language Spanish program, now with one classroom in each K-5 grade level.

Our parent, volunteer, and community support is outstanding. Several years ago I instituted our Lily B. Dads' Club and to this day we have about twenty dads who give of their time mentoring kids and encouraging struggling readers. They also pitch in to help with all kinds of classroom and school projects. The Lily B. welcome mat is always out for our grandparents too, inviting them to come and have lunch any day with the children.

Year after year, I'm so grateful for our "getterdone" PTA. They contribute in countless ways to our students, staff, and our building. Currently, they are restoring the historic hallway ceilings and have updated the staff lounge. Other volunteers

generously contribute their time, like Ralph who every single morning greets our kids as they come to school.

The Lily B. faculty is outstanding. My responsibility as a leader is to ensure we maintain great teaching and support staff. Once an individual becomes part of our Lily B. team very few leave. When we do have vacancies, I consider an applicant's passion for education a deciding factor. Our teachers and staff are open to learning themselves, adapting,

and acquiring new skills as necessary. The result is all twenty-eight home rooms, seven special programs, our tutors, and our support staff from our assistant principal, instructional coach, counselor, and nurse all take seriously and put into practice our Lily B. commitment to "Every Child Every Day."

Transitions matter. Here they begin by welcoming our youngest PK and K students. Again our parents pitch in, hosting kindergarten Q&A coffees in their homes and helping with Spring kindergarten meet-and-greet tours. We take our fifthgraders to McLean 6th in the fall to give them a glimpse of what awaits them.

Appreciating public schools is local. Neighborhood schools matter. Together we are here for each of our children. When a child comes to school here, they are enveloped in a network of dedication with the single purpose to care for and educate that student toward a bright future. The Lily B. success is no accident. It's a shared, sacred trust . . ." Every Child, Every Day!"

Karen BrownPrincipal, McLean Sixth

I grew up in South Florida, attended college in Maryland, and began teaching in the FWISD in 1994. Later I earned my master's at TCU and my doctorate in education from Tarleton State University.

My husband and I have built our family here. Our three kids all went through this pyramid (elementary, to McLean 6th, to McLean Middle, to Paschal). Our oldest is twenty-six, and our younger two are at Paschal. As a family, we like to ski and cheer on our favorite college teams. Like most families, we have busy lives and are active in the community.

A guiding principle for me is "treat people the way you want to be treated." I love our school. It is the perfect combination of freedom and structure. McLean 6th is a gentle transition from elementary. Here our students get to practice "big school" requirements like walking to assigned classes on their own. Our organized structure allows kids to begin their secondary school experiences as easily as possible. They grow in confidence by making new friends, learning to adjust, and becoming more personally responsible. Still, we have expectations to help them develop good academic habits. In advisory periods, we introduce students to FWISD's FOCUS system where students and parents can pay attention to grades. Our relatively small class sizes (average 18:1) in the core areas of English language arts and mathematics make this possible.

There are gifts as well as challenges to being in a single-grade school. The time we have to make a difference for our kids is compressed. We are proactive about student transitions from our feeder elementary schools to McLean Middle. Bridging transition challenges inherent in planning and academic continuity includes coordination efforts with our administrative teams and faculties. Building collegiality among our feeder schools depends on

communication, trust, and professional respect. We work together with the elementary schools and parents to match the kids and schedules. We host several parent conferences, especially for students with special needs.

We love hosting our future families in the spring. It is essential early on to listen to parents and respond to their questions and concerns. These interactive meetings usually last about an hour and include building tours. We accommodate parents who, for whatever reason, cannot attend the scheduled sessions. By reaching out and engaging with our parents we develop relationships that reassure them about McLean 6th and what's ahead for students.

My personal goal is to let parents know, that whatever question or anxiety they may have, together we will work to figure out solutions. The bottom line: we want to get it right for the child. I am grateful for active and involved parents. Even beyond our amazing PTA organization and programs, our parents are valued as integral to the success of their children and our school. Many times we hear parents' statements like "this is the best year ever." The "extraordinary magic" at McLean 6th is because of our outstanding teachers. They "get"

kids of this age and are devoted to assuring that students achieve and, in the process, grow in their love of learning, plus, have fun doing it. Our faculty's "you can do it!" approach provides 6th graders with chances to take on challenges and develop knowing that we understand and believe in them.

In August, before the beginning of the school year, we conduct our half-day (4-hour) "Bluejay Camp." We have school tours, fun team-building activities, and a chance for the new 6th graders to meet their teachers. New student participation is usually over fifty percent.

CANINE PANCREATITIS

Pancreatitis is a relatively common disease in dogs. It comes in two forms.

The more common and more recognizable form is acute pancreatitis. This usually occurs after getting tidbits at Thanksgiving or Christmas dinners or getting into the trash. A high-fat meal is the likely culprit. The fat causes the pancreas to overwork to produce enzymes to break down the fat. The enzymes then start working on the pancreas itself.

Acute pancreatitis shows as lethargy, vomiting, and diarrhea. The dog is usually in pain and may or may not be running a fever. The dog then becomes dehydrated. Bacteria from the gut start attacking the pancreas causing more inflammation. The dog can become very sick quickly. Getting on fluids, antibiotics, pain and antinausea medications, can be lifesaving.

Chronic pancreatitis is less common (we think) and much more subtle. Chronic pancreatitis is the much more common form in cats. It may be the pet is feeling blah for a day or two every four-to-six weeks or so. Appetite may be down a little. Usually we don't see any vomiting. But we may see diarrhea. The dog isn't usually in much pain and continues to drink.

The causes of chronic pancreatitis are not well defined. It could be caused by bacteria from the gut. It could be diet. It could be autoimmune. Some have theorized that it could be a virus. Since it is mild and usually self-limiting, it is hard to figure out a specific cause.

Both forms can have long-lasting effects. Abscesses can form. Scarring usually occurs. Adhesions to surrounding structures can form. This in turn may cause ongoing "tummy issues."

The pancreas serves two major functions. The exocrine

function is to produce enzymes to break down ingested foods. The endocrine function is to produce insulin. Damage to the pancreas can cause enough disruption in its production of one or both of these. Exocrine PancreaticInsufficiency (you may have seen commercials for human medications on TV) causes chronic diarrhea. Treatment is simple. Adding enzymes to the food before the dog eats is usually all it takes to correct it. It is however a lifelong treatment. Insulin-dependent diabetes is the endocrine deficiency. Treatment requires twice daily (or more frequent) insulin injections and regular monitoring. Diabetes in dogs can be difficult to control and maintain. Many things (infections, dental disease, or Cushing's) can affect the amount of insulin needed. This too is a lifelong treatment.

The acute form is easier to prevent and diagnose. But both forms can have a significant lifelong impact. There is hope, however. A new drug has been approved for clinical trials for acute pancreatitis. It will possibly be available to the market as early as next year.

orchids, and clematis. Additionally, they offer a curated collection of candles and soaps.






The design studio side caters to weddings (including destination weddings) and corporate

PESTO CHICKEN SALAD IN AVOCADO HALVES

Jaimie says this is the best chicken salad she's ever had.

INGREDIENTS:

Rotisserie Chicken

½ cup sun-dried tomatoes, chopped

2 cups fresh basil

2 tbsp fresh lemon juice

2 tbsp nutritional yeast

1 tbsp hemp seeds

½ tsp garlic powder

1/4 tsp sea salt

1/4 tsp ground black pepper

1/4 cup extra-virgin olive oil

4 large avocados

DIRECTIONS:

Cut meat off rotisserie chicken into bite-sized

pieces. Place chicken in a bowl. Add sun-dried tomatoes to bowl.

Prepare pesto: In a food processor, add basil, lemon juice, yeast, hemp seeds, garlic powder, salt, and pepper. Pulse until basil is finely chopped. With motor running, drizzle in oil; process until smooth. Pour pesto over chicken mixture and stir to combine.

Halve and pit avocados. Remove avocado flesh from skin. Fill each avocado half with mixture.

does...added bonus. She says she doesn't think she will ever fry bacon in the traditional way again.

WHAT YOU WILL NEED:

1 lb. package of bacon

Metal sheet pan

Paper towels

STEP 1: PREP THE BACON

Remove bacon from packaging and arrange the slices on a baking sheet, overlapping the lean edge of each slice with the fat edge of the next one.

STEP 2: BAKE FOR 25 MINUTES

Preheat the oven for 400° F. Place sheet pan

in the oven on the uppermost rack and begin baking. After twelve minutes, switch the pan to the lower rack and continue cooking another twelve-to-thirteen minutes until slices are golden brown and crispy.

Flavor Upgrade: When switching racks, brush the bacon strips with maple syrup and sprinkle with black pepper.

STEP 3: DRAIN BACON STRIPS

Remove pan from oven and let cool slightly. Layer two-to-three paper towel pieces on a plate. Transfer strips, one by one, to the paper towels and let sit briefly to allow the grease to soak into the towels. Then serve!

THE JOY OF MEDICARE: TRAVEL OUTSIDE OF THE UNITED STATES AND MEDICARE COVERAGE

Lets' go! Hop on a cruise, do the Grand European tour, or eat, love, and pray through India. But what will your Medicare plan cover while you are out completing the bucket list?

To Medicare, "Outside the U.S." means anywhere other than the fifty states of the U.S., the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Northern Mariana Islands.

As a traveler, I have some "experienced" tips for you along the way. "Experienced" usually means "I found this out the hard way." Not only about Medicare plans but some "extra" tips. I now recommend for everyone some things that used to be a luxury. Travel Insurance. Flight delays, diseases, natural disasters—you never know what will happen. Be sure the travel insurance plan will cover those. Carry extra credit cards for medical care or quarantine in a foreign hotel.

What Medicare pays under each type of plan:

Medicare Supplement/MediGap

Most Medicare Supplement (Medigap) policies offer additional coverage for emergency health care services outside the U.S. This coverage is included in plans C, D, E, F, C, H, I, J, M or N. Emergency care is covered if it begins during the first sixty days of the trip. After a \$250 yearly deductible, it will pay 80% of the billed charges, with a lifetime maximum of \$50,000. My "experienced tip" is that foreign hospitals will not know how Medicare works and will not "just bill Medicare" for you. Billing is hard enough on the USA side! Pay in full, then send total bill for reimbursement when you get back to USA.

Medicare Advantage Plans

All Medicare Advantage plans offer worldwide emergency coverage, urgently needed services, and emergency transportation benefits. Pay the full cost of the emergency health care on discharge, then submit for reimbursement from the insurance company, minus all applicable copays, coinsurance and deductibles.

Original Medicare Coverage. I hope this is not all you have by now! Please tell me you have upgraded.

If you live in the U.S. and the foreign hospital is closer to your home than the nearest U.S. hospital that can treat your medical condition, regardless of whether it's an emergency or everyday healthcare, you are covered. The full cost must be paid on discharge, then submit an itemized bill to Medicare for reimbursement.

As a warning and reminder on only Original Medicare: if you only have Original Medicare A and B for Medicare, there in NO CAP on what you can be charged. I will repeat that scary fact: no cap on what you can be charged. Technically, your portion will be 20% but 20% of what amount?

So, book that trip, pack your bags and take off for the wild blue yonder knowing how your plan will work!




ROSIE'S BOOK CORNER
